

## ***EDITORIAL***

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The purpose of *Arts* is to publish work of scholarly interest to members of the Association; contributions for consideration are welcome. *Arts* also publishes the inaugural lectures of newly appointed professors. It is a matter for regret that in recent years some inaugurals have either not been given or have not been made available for publication.

Dr W. J. (Bill) Jobling, Reader in the School of Studies in Religion, died suddenly in December 1994. He was warmly liked, and respected as a scholar, throughout the Faculty. The eulogy read by Dr Kenneth Cable is printed here.

We record also, with regret, the death in January of Athanasius Pryor Treweek (1911–1995). Ath (as he was widely known) took both a First in Latin and Greek, with the University Medal in Classics, and an Honours degree in Mathematics. The combination led to a PhD thesis on fourth-century Greek geometry. After joining the Department of Greek in 1938, he served with distinction in World War II as a code-breaker. Later he became a Sub-Dean of the Faculty, and was Associate Professor from 1965 to his retirement in 1971. Emeritus Professor Bill Ritchie writes: Apart from his particular interest in Greek mathematics, Ath's interests were especially in the language, of which he had a particularly fine knowledge. He was a very effective teacher at all levels, and especially for those whose bent was towards philological studies. He will be remembered with respect and affection by a generation of classicists.
