It is with extreme regret that your Council have to report that we have lost by death Messrs. Lawrence Hargrave, Gordon Marr, and C. N. R. Huntley.

The former gentleman was one of our early members, having joined in the year 1875. His work is well known to us all, and his papers on aeronautics and aero-dyna-

mics have been so well known that comment on their value here would be superfluous. We are indeed proud to have been associated with such a personality. In Mr. Gordon Marr, we also lose a very prominent figure in the Engineering community of Sydney. The memory of Lieutenant C. N. R. Huntley will be ever revered by our members, as he was the first on our roll to lay down his life for the Empire. The death of Mr. H. Perdriau, a member since 1873, we also sincerely regret.

Membership.—The total number of members of the several grades is now 239, as compared with 272 at the close of last Session. The falling off as shown should not be taken as an indication of retrogression, as this can be accounted for by the very critical period through which we are passing at the present juncture, and the determination of your Council to remove from the roll members who have failed to keep their obligations, and who, are therefore, a needless expense to the Association generally.

We therefore ask your co-operation in obtaining further active members to keep the Association in a flourishing condition.

#### NEW GRADE OF MEMBERSHIP.

As it had been considered for some time past that some amendment was necessary in the Constitution of the Association for provision of a grade between Student-Associate, and full Member, it was proposed to amend the By-Laws accordingly. Therefore at the General Meeting, held on 7th July, 1915, the following amendments (see new rules) were brought forward, and were ratified at the General Meeting held on August 12th, 1915.

## LIBRARY REPORT.

During the year, seven Special Meetings of the Committee have been held. It was considered that the first thing that should be dealt with was the putting in order of the Transactions and Proceedings already in the Library, binding those which it was desirable should be retained permanently, and to provide proper housing accommodation for them. This work has been carried out at a cost of £67 1s. 9d. After doing this the Committee carefully considered the desirability of procuring by exchange, the transactions of other Associations than those already received, and in deciding upon those which it would appear desirable we should now obtain for our Library, we have been largely guided by the practice of the Institute of Mechanical Engineers, London. The additional Societies whose transactions are desired we are now in communication with, but have not yet received all the replies. After having dealt with that section of the Library containing Transactions and Proceedings, the Committee turned its attention to the other section, viz., -text books and works of reference. The existing works of reference in the Library are of little value, so that we are practically establishing a new section, and we have prepared a list of books to act as the nucleus of this part of the Library.

With regard to the cataloguing of both the Transactions and the Works of Rerefence, the Committee has to advise that no complete catalogue has been in use hitherto, so that your Committee was free to adopt a new and up-to-date system, and in this connection we obtained the advice of the Public Librarian of New South Wales, who very willingly offered to recommend a simple system for our Library. Our catalogues are not yet complete, but we will shortly be able to definitely advise the Council of the system adopted, and as soon as the catalogues are complete and the nucleus of our reference works installed, we propose to issue a list of the transactions and books of reference to each Member of the Association, and also to recommend some means whereby better use can be made of them by the Members.

With regard to the suggestion by the Electrical Association for an amalgamation of our Libraries, your Committee strongly recommends that this matter be held in abeyance for the present, and especially until we have our own Library in proper order, but it might be well to mention that the Committee feels that some means of rendering our Library available to other kindred Associations should probably be adopted even if the amalgamation of the Libraries of any of them is considered undesirable.

Appended is a statement of the expenditure on account of the Library during the past year, and from which it will be seen that there is a balance of £78 10s. 9d. still available from this year's interest on the P. N. Russell bequest, whilst, we should also mention that although the cost of binding Transactions during the past year has been fairly heavy, this will not be so in future, when it will simply be a matter of binding single volumes as they come to hand. The expense in this connection for the past year has been largely in connection with the binding of volumes for which the money was not available in past years to enable the work to be properly carried out.


