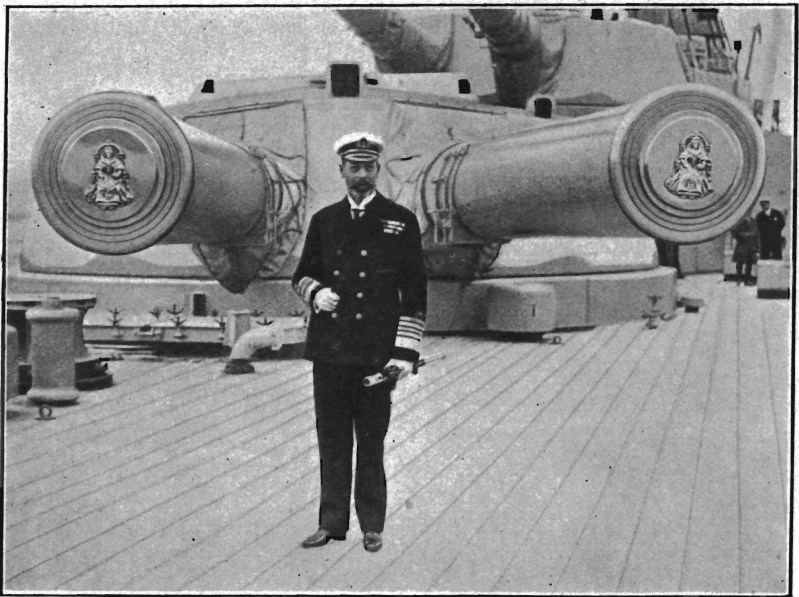

In reading down this long list of names one is struck with the thought that a great test was applied during the period of national crisis—the truest test of civilisation, viz., the one which reveals the quality of the country's manhood. That our University passed this test with honour is evident.

We now come to the saddest, and at the same time the most glorious, chapter in the history of this school—the record of those who gave their lives in the defence of the Empire.

During the reading of these names, which will be for ever revered in the annals of our University, I would ask you to stand as a token of our respect and esteem.

This roll of duty and sacrifice records that 39 men gave their lives for the Empire, and that 34 men were wounded.

I would ask you to continue standing whilst the picture of the King is exhibited on the screen.

His Majesty is here depicted standing on the deck of the battleship "Queen Elizabeth." The picture is symbolic of the dignity and strength of the great Empire to which we belong.

In conclusion, I may remind you that from year to year economic problems of increasing difficulty will arise, on the solution of which the safety of the Empire will depend.
