

Religions are in a constant interplay between identity and change, dynamic processes in which the survival of traditions are at stake. What gives identity to a religion? How do religions maintain their identities when faced with dispersal, secularism or pluralism. How do religions relate to the quest for identity? What are the religious dimensions of various identities? These and other issues are addressed — largely in terms of specific case-studies — in this selection of 28 papers from the 15th IAHR Congress held in Sydney in 1985.
