Choose Life. A Dialogue between Arnold Toynbee and Daisaku Ikeda. Richard Gage, editor. Oxford: Oxford University Press, 1989. (Copyright 1976) 374 pages.

Arnold Toynbee, "an international sage", died in October 1975 at the age of 86. Ikeda is President of soka Gakkai International, a Buddhist lay organization with ten million members, and "devoted to the promotion of education, culture and peace". Between 1971 and 1974 these two engaged in discussion of a wide range of issues, considering the human predicament in its personal and social, political and international. philosophical and religious aspects. The conversations were recorded and then edited for publication by Richard Gage. The result is a well bound, well designed volume, occasionally urbane and insightful, but mostly inflated, selfindulgent, platitudinous and banal.

## Better Together. Christian Partnership in a Hurt City

Derek Worlock and David Sheppard London: Penguin Books, 1989 (First published by Hodder and Stoughton 1988) 318 pages \$Aust. 12.99

David Sheppard is Anglican Bishop of Liverpool and a former England cricketer. Derek Worlock is Roman Catholic Archbishop of Liverpool. Finding themselves neighbours in a city close to bankruptcy, a city of strong sectarian loyalties and bitter deprivation, these two outstanding Christian clerics have called for Christian unity and joined forces to fight for the renewal of their city. It's a heartening and entertaining story of courage and practical action arising from a shared Christian vision.

#### Radical Christianity

Christopher Rowland Cambridge (U.K.): Polity Press, 1988 viii + 199 pages Paperback \$Aust.27.95 Distributed in Australia by Allen & Unwin

Christopher Rowland lectures in Divinity at the University of Cambridge and is Dean and Fellow of Jesus College. His book deals with the history of radical (apocalyptic) Christianity by discussing some of the most important developments and figures from the millenarian movements of early Christianity to Muenzer and Winstanley, then to the liberation theology of today. Rowland clearly documents the notion that, at different times and places, Christian ideas have had a radical, critical role and have served as a basis for programmes of social change.

### Words and The Word. Language, poetics and biblical interpretation Stephen Prickett

Stephen Prickett, Professor of English at the Australian National University, "pursues the question of the relationship between religion and poetics, and in particular the nature of religious language, investigating the hermeneutic, epistemological and linguistic reverberations of eighteenth, nineteenth and twentieth-century theories of biblical interpretation".

### Buddhism in Australia 1848-1988 Paul Croucher

Kensington, N.S.W., Australia: New South Wales University Press, 1989 ix + 147 pages.

Paul Croucher, born in 1961, grew up in Sydney and Melbourne, encountered Buddhism in 1979 and began to study with Tibetan teachers soon after. At present he is doing a Ph.D. in Zen history. His book chronicles the history of Buddhism in Australia and its influence on our poetry, art and religious life. "A colourful mosaic of eccentrics, charlatans and domineering personalities together with the occasional saintly character."


