New South Wales

Australian Catholic University

In the reorganisation of the ACU into Faculties, the School of Religion and Philosophy has been situated in the Faculty of Arts and Sciences. In NSW, the School itself has two Departments; The Department of Theology and Philosophy, and the Department od Religious Education.

Professor Peter Carpenter is the Dean of the Faculty of Arts and Sciences. In NSW, Dr Patricia Malone is the Head of the School of Religion and Philosophy; Dr Robert Gascoigne is the Head of the Department of Theology and Philosophy; and Associate Professor Graham Rossiter is the Head of the Department of Religious Education.

Members of the Departments teach Religion units in the Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Education, and the Bachelor of Teaching Programs; as well as teaching a number of Values and Ethics units in the Bachelor of Nursing, and the Bachelor of Human Movement Studies Programs. There are members of the Department of Theology and Philosophy who are involved in the John Plunkett Centre for Ethics in Health Care, which is a joint venture of the University and St

Vincent's Hospital; and is located on the Darlinghurst Campus of St Vincent's. Dr Bernadette Tobin is Director of this centre. As a result of Mechanism B funding a Moral and Religious Education Project has commenced, under the co-ordinating role of Associate Professor Graham Rossiter.

The Senate of the University has approved the first intake of PhD students to commence in 1995, and there are several applicants in the area of Religious Studies and Religious Education.

The University has advertised a position for a Professor of Theology, whose role during the next five years is to advise and assist the Vice-Chancellor in the development of suitable arrangements for Theology, and to undertake and develop teaching, scholarship, and research in the area.

University of Sydney

At the University of Sydney, the Head of School, Jim Tulip, has been concentrating on the Postgraduate Centre for Religion and Theology, which has within it over 80 students pursuing higher degrees. He is concerned to strengthen the Centre further with a still greater encouragement of theological college graduates to enter the University at the higher degree level. Remaining high on his administrative agenda is his support for the new NSW Religious Studies high school curriculum, through the provision of in-service training. Recent moves at Melbourne and

Monash to offer combined Arts/Theol undergraduate degrees have led him to explore similar possibilities for Sydney and to assess the cross-accreditation issues involved, perhaps with a partial usage of course offerings in the Sydney College of Divinity (SCD).

Bill Jobling has returned from holding the Dorot Research Professorship in Jerusalem. Garry Trompf and John Cooper have become editors of a new monograph series on Gnostic Studies, published from the University of Groningen. Jim Tulip is working towards a large collaborative Research Grant in relation to social welfare. Recent thesis submissions include Colleen Mallone on Josephite Missionaries to the Aborigines (MPhil), Maurice Rimon on Kiribati Pastoral Theology (MThHons), Jennifer Farrell on Human Movement and Liturgy (PhD).

A feast of conferences at New England and Macquarie early in July brought welcome opportunity for the exchange of ideas. Garry Trompf and his research assistant Ruth Lewin-Broit were invited to deliver papers at the Augustinianum in the Vatican in early May. Eric Sharpe will make a special contribution to the American Academy of Religions meeting, Washington DC in November. Jim Tulip is organising a forthcoming Sydney conference on Religion and the Arts, with Dr David Jasper, Glasgow University, being the key speaker (in January 1994).

Queensland

University of Queensland

The Department of Studies in Religion at UQ is offering several new courses this year, including Aboriginal Religions, Women in Religion, New Religious Movements, Belief and Unbelief, and Buddhist Meditation in Theory and Practice. Enrolments in all subjects are high, indicating a continuation of the upward trend of the last few years: in 1992 the Department had the largest number of internally enrolled students in its history.

The Department's teaching staff has been augmented this semester by visiting lecturer Dr Ute Pietruschka of the Institut für Orientalistik at Martin-Luther-Universität, Halle. She is teaching the course in Islam.

Some of the regular teaching staff are back in the Department after spending time overseas for various reasons. Ed Conrad was on long service leave followed by six months as Visiting Scholar at Princeton Theological Seminary. While there he did research on a comparative study of the Book of the Twelve and the Book of Isaiah as prophetic books. Now back in Brisbane, he has been appointed

to the Sub-Committee for the Study of Religion by the Board of Secondary Schools Studies, where he is involved in re-writing the curriculum.

Also back from overseas is Majella Franzmann. She spent 19 months as Alexander von Humboldt Research Fellow at the Protestant faculty of the University of Tübingen, where she was doing research on the character of Jesus in the Nag Hammadi Writings. While there she was awarded the Forschungspreis für jüngere Wissenschaftler, 1992.

Michael Lattke has been awarded the degree of Doctor of Letters, a rare honour conferred only four times in the history of the University of Queensland. He will be attending the Annual General Meeting of the SNTS at the University of Chicago in August.

Post-graduate numbers remain high. The most recent successful candidate is Mavis Rose, whose thesis A History of Feminist Influences and Women's Response to them in the Australian Anglican Church 1901-1992 has recently been accepted for the PhD.

Religion Studies and the Open Learning Initiative

In collaboration with religion studies staff at Deakin we have now developed two units in what is hoped will eventually be a full major in Religion Studies offered through the Open Learning Agency of Australia. These materials have been pro-

duced under enormous pressure (immediate deadlines seem to be a feature of the initiative).

The two subjects are *Religion Studies 1A: The Long Search* which is built around the television series *The Long Search* and focussed on Judaism, Islam, Christianity, Australian Aboriginal Religion, Buddhism, and Hinduism. The second subject is *Religion Studies 1B: Myth*,

Ritual and the Sacred. This is a text based subject (it has no television or radio component) which explores such religious phenomena as beliefs, sacred space, sacred persons, ritual, religious experience, sacred texts, ethics, and sacred stories.

Deakin will be co-ordinating the next subject in the series and it is planned that a fourth subject will also be developed. It is hoped that it will benefit the field of Religion Studies by giving it a higher profile nationally.

Awards

From 1994 Religion Studies at the University of South Australia will offer a full profile of awards in religion education and religion studies. This will include majors in undergraduate awards, MEd (course work or research), MA, and PhD.

Retirement of Jerome Crowe

Jerome Crowe retires from the department at the end of 1993. His departure will be a great loss to Religion Studies at UniSA. To honour his personal and academic contribution in establishing the Catholic Studies offerings in the department a Colloquium will be held in his honour on Friday 12 November at UniSA, Underdale.

Staff Notes

After seventeen years at the Salisbury campus, Robert Crotty has transfered to Underdale where he has become part of the Religion Studies Department. Robert is presently co-ordinator of the MA(Religion Studies). In 1975 at Salisbury he had established Religion Studies as a major. However, the demise of the BEd Secondary heralded the end of Religion Studies as a major discipline at Salisbury.

In recent times Robert has been involved in research on the letter of James and issues connected with it. This research gained momentum from a study leave program back in 1988 spent at the

Oxford Centre for Postgraduate Hebrew Studies. It has involved literary work on the letter and a study of the historical implications of the literary study. Robert hopes to continue his research next year during another study leave period.

Norman Habel delivered a paper at the AASR conference entitled 'Does the Bible support the land rights of indigenous peoples?'. He continues to research Land ideologies in the Hebrew scriptures and will have a book released on the subject in late 1994. He will lead a workshop of about 1000 clergy in Minneapolis in January.

Marion Maddox delivered a paper at the Philosophy and Applied Ethics Re-Examined conference on the impact of feminist and naturalised epistemologies on philosophical understandings of applied ethics, and also presented a paper entitled 'Ethics and Rhetoric of the Starving Child' at the Australian Systemic-Functional Linguistics conference. She was 'theologian-in-residence' at a three-day intensive workshop on domestic violence organised for church and welfare workers by the Joint Churches Working Group on Domestic Violence, and is continuing to do research on religion, sexuality, and power.

Penny Magee gave one of the Charles Strong lectures at AASR in Armidale, and later in July participated in the State, Sexuality and Reproduction in Asia and the Pacific three day meeting of RSPacS, ANU. She is also convening a panel on gender and religion for the Women in Asia conference in Melbourne in November. Other work includes the completion of a DEET funded Asian Studies Project with the making of a film of Asian religious ritual in Adelaide. Highlight of the year was the completion of the supervision of the first Master's degree thesis in

Asian Studies in the University: Barbara Kameniar, on the *maechii* in Thailand.

Basil Moore spent six months in South Africa in 1992 researching South African understandings of racism, anti-racism education, and the current state of the black theology movement. Interested researchers can get copies of his research reports from him.

Michael O'Donoghue has returned from Professional Experience Leave during which he spent some time working at the Australian Centre for Egyptology at Macquarie University. The first stage of his research was reflected in his paper presented at the AASR conference in Armidale titled 'Shabtis: ancient Egyptian funerary statuettes in the collection of the South Australian Museum'.

Margaret O'Toole received a University of South Australia award for excellence on teaching in 1992. With the funds she is currently overseas working on Feminist Theology and Religion Education.

Evan Zuesse continues his leave at Monash University where he is establishing a centre for Jewish Studies.

New Zealand Notes

from The Yana

University of Canterbury

Paul Harrison, Acting Head of Department, has been granted twelve months study leave during 1994. He will begin by

attending the World Sanskrit Conference in Melbourne in January. The next five months or so will be spent at Oxford, where he will take up his appointment as Numata Visitor in Buddhist Studies at Balliol for the Hilary and Trinity terms. From mid-July to mid-September he will spend two months at Tabo monastery in Spiti District, Himachal Predesh, investigating the monastery's collection of Tibetan canonical manuscripts (11th century onwards) with a team of scholars from Austria, Switzerland, Germany and Italy. Later in 1994 he will return to Japan for a second graduate seminar series at Otani University in Kyoto.

Bill Shepard and Bo Sax are teaching a Continuing Education course entitled 'Flashpoints in the Muslim World'. Bill is discussing Bosnia, Egypt, the Palestinians, and Iran. Bo is doing a session on India.

Bo Sax will be in the Central Himalayas of India for approximately four months from October 1993, continuing his research on *Pandava Lila*, a Garhwali tradition of ritual performance in Mahabharata. This research is sponsored by the University of Canterbury.

1993 enrolments are 291 for Stage I papers, 101 for Stage II papers 13 for Stage III and 17 for higher level papers.

Massey University

A Diploma in Humanities (Religious Studies) program, combining Albany-based courses with extramural papers from Palmerston North, is being proposed for launching in 1995. Indications are that this new 'North Shore' university will grow rapidly, and the Massey department is preparing to be involved at all levels. Mutually beneficial cooperation with other Auckland religious tertiary institutions is envisaged.

University of Waikato

Doug Pratt was on sabbatical at Kingsmead College (Selly Oak), Birmingham focussing particularly on interfaith conversations between Christians and Muslims.
